Annual Report of the Georgia Historical Society for the Year 2023

The year 2023 was an eventful one for the Georgia Historical Society. Thanks to the continued generosity of our many donors, as well as careful management and dynamic leadership at both the board and staff level, we were able to put the Covid 19 pandemic in the rearview mirror and once again resume the dramatic growth of the previous decades. Indeed, by every measure, both programmatically and financially, the past twelve months were among the most successful in our institution's 185-year history.

The following report offers an in-depth look at the Georgia Historical Society's programming, services, fund raising, and financial activity of 2023 (a full listing of which can be found after this introduction).

Here are a few of the highlights that made it a memorable and remarkable year:

- ★ Completion of the \$15 million *Next Century Initiative* campaign.
- ★ A successful *Georgia History Festival*, our annual K-12 education program, which taught history to 250,000 Georgia students and raised a record \$1,915,759 for statewide history education and research.

- ★ The induction of the 2023 Georgia Trustees, Aflac CEO Dan Amos, and Children’s Health Care of Atlanta CEO Donna Highland, conferring on them the state’s highest honor.
- ★ Completion and board approval of a new five-year strategic plan, *Building on the Legacy*.
- ★ Acquisition of several historically significant archival collections, including the papers of former US Deputy Attorney General Larry Thompson, Lieutenant general Donald “Rosie” Rosenblum, US Army, and *Atlanta Journal-Constitution* crime reporter Bill Rankin.
- ★ The selection of the iconic Georgia businesses Grady Hospital, Fieldale Farms, Byrd Cookies, Anthem Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Georgia, the Georgia Chamber, and the Georgia Lottery as honorees of the Georgia Business History Initiative.
- ★ Conservation of several priceless pieces of historic artwork, including the portraits of Georgia governor John Houstoun and colonial merchant James Habersham, made possible by the Raymond M. and Karen R. Masciarella II Conservation Fund.
- ★ The appointment by Governor Brian Kemp of GHS president and CEO W. Todd Groce as vice chair and one of the three commissioners on the Georgia US250 Commission.

As noted above, one of the accomplishments of 2023 was the acquisition of several important archival collections that document Georgia’s role in American history. Foremost among these were the papers of former US Deputy Attorney General Larry Thompson. A mentee of Judge Griffin Bell (whose papers are also housed at GHS), Larry left a successful career at the prestigious Atlanta law firm of King and Spalding to serve his country as deputy attorney general of the United States during the administration of President George W. Bush. His tenure spanned one of the most momentous periods in American history, which included the infamous 9-11 attack and the War on Terror. Another Georgia leader who donated his papers last year to GHS was the late Lieutenant general Gen. Donald “Rosie” Rosenblum, US Army. During a long and distinguished military career that included combat tours in the

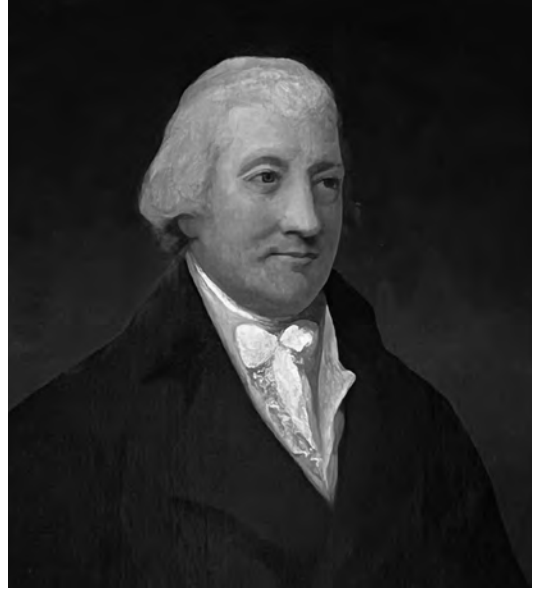
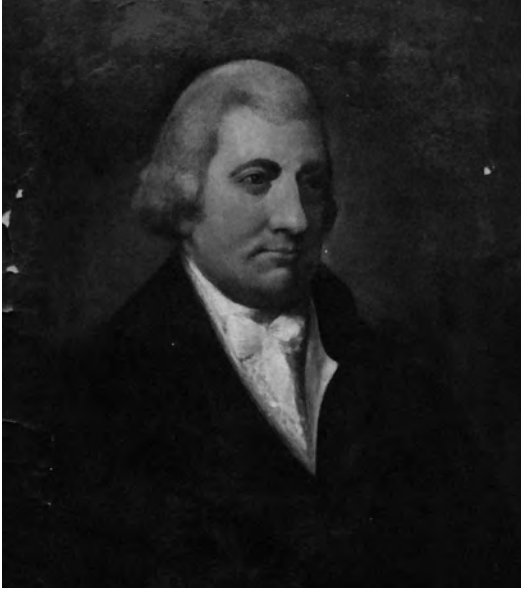

Korean and Vietnam wars, Rosie commanded First Army, XVIII Airborne Corps, the 82nd Airborne Division, and the 24th Infantry Division during the transition of Camp Stewart to Fort Stewart.

GHS also acquired the papers of the *Atlanta Journal-Constitution* crime reporter Bill Rankin. For over three decades, Bill has covered some of the most sensational trials in the state's history: Atlanta lawyer Fred Tokars, NFL star Ray Lewis, the hot-car case against Justin Ross Harris, and the murder of Ahmaud Arbery. The acquisition of the Rankin papers added to our growing collection of *AJC* materials. To complement Bill's collection, GHS accepted a fascinating cache of letters written by people from across the country during the trial of the Ahmaud Arbery murderers to Superior Court Judge Timothy Walmsley, who presided over the Arbery case. Recognizing their significance, Judge Walmsley donated the letters to GHS, where they will provide future historians with a window into American attitudes about race and racial justice at the beginning of the twenty-first century.

One of the highlights of 2023 was the Georgia Trustees Gala held on April 22 in Savannah. The theme of this year's gala was "Indelible," and the extraordinary



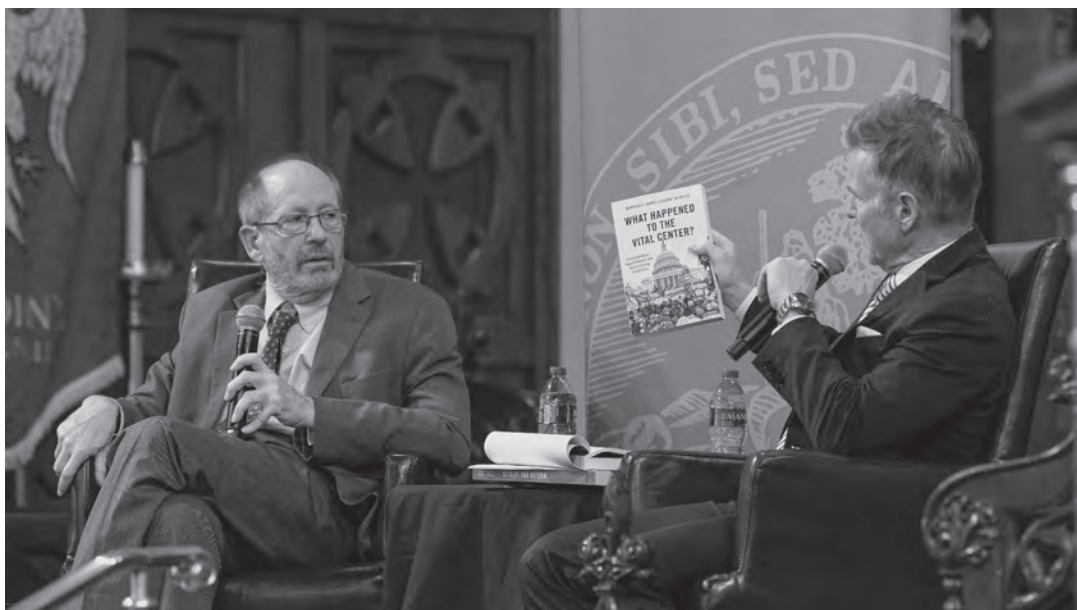

evening left an indelible memory on all those who participated. The Gala featured the induction of the Georgia Trustees—Aflac CEO Dan Amos, and Childrens Healthcare of Atlanta CEO Donna Hyland. Due to Governor Brian Kemp’s absence, United States senator Raphael Warnock inducted the new Trustees. Many other dignitaries attended and participated in the festivities, including Georgia house speaker Jon Burns, who brought greetings on behalf of the state, Dekalb County CEO Michael Thurmond, and the family of Georgia Trustee Vince Dooley. The Gala was the culmination of a successful 2022–2023 *Georgia History Festival* that brought history education to approximately 250,000 students and teachers across the state.

Another significant achievement of 2023 was creating a new strategic plan to guide our institutional growth over the next five years. Led by Board vice chair David Abney and Endowment Trust chair Dr. William T. “Ted” Moore, a committee composed of the Board of Curators and staff carefully crafted a road map for taking GHS to the next level, focusing on issues like expanded educational programming, enhanced research services, collections acquisition and accessibility, staffing, leadership succession, facilities, and financial security. The next step, which we will take in 2024, is to develop and launch a fundraising campaign to achieve these goals.

In addition to these accomplishments, the ongoing work of the Georgia Historical Society continued unabated. We helped facilitate new scholarship by providing thousands of researchers from across the globe access to our state’s documentary legacy, including CBS News, which sought our assistance in the creation of a half-hour documentary on the history of “Forty Acres and a Mule.” We repaired, replaced, and erected nearly one hundred historical markers, ensuring that Georgians and visitors alike will continue to learn about our state’s past. Under the skillful editorship of Dr. Glenn McNair, we published four issues of the award-winning *Georgia Historical Quarterly*, making accessible to the public cutting-edge historical scholarship. The *Business History Initiative* and *Georgia Civil Rights Trail* used historical markers and educator resources to teach Georgia history to adults and school children alike. We also held another round of teacher-training seminars, enhancing classroom instruction by providing educators with the strategies and tools they need to teach difficult, but necessary, history.

In 2026, the United States will celebrate its 250th anniversary. In commemoration of this milestone, during 2023 the Georgia Historical Society launched a three-year project entitled “Restoring Trust in American Institutions: History and the

Foundations of American Democracy.” Over the next three years, leading up to the 2026 anniversary, GHS will use history to look at various pillars of democracy, institutions that have insured the freedom of all Americans and the preservation of democracy: a free press, an independent judiciary, our electoral system, and our historic fidelity to the US Constitution. Accordingly, the theme of the 2023 *Georgia History Festival* was “Governing Georgia over Three Centuries.” The festival kicked off in September with an engaging presentation by the University of Virginia political scientist Sidney Milkis. The UVA Club of Savannah co-sponsored the program.

Throughout the year, GHS continued to serve as a trusted resource and counselor to leaders in every field, including the business community, when it comes to history. Academics, scholars, teachers, and leaders in the fields of business, politics, and journalism turned to GHS for perspective and historical context on issues ranging from Confederate monuments and race relations to economic development and the future of democracy. GHS historians and educators delivered dozens of public presentations across the state and beyond, helping leaders to gain a better understanding of our past in order to help them make informed decisions about the future.



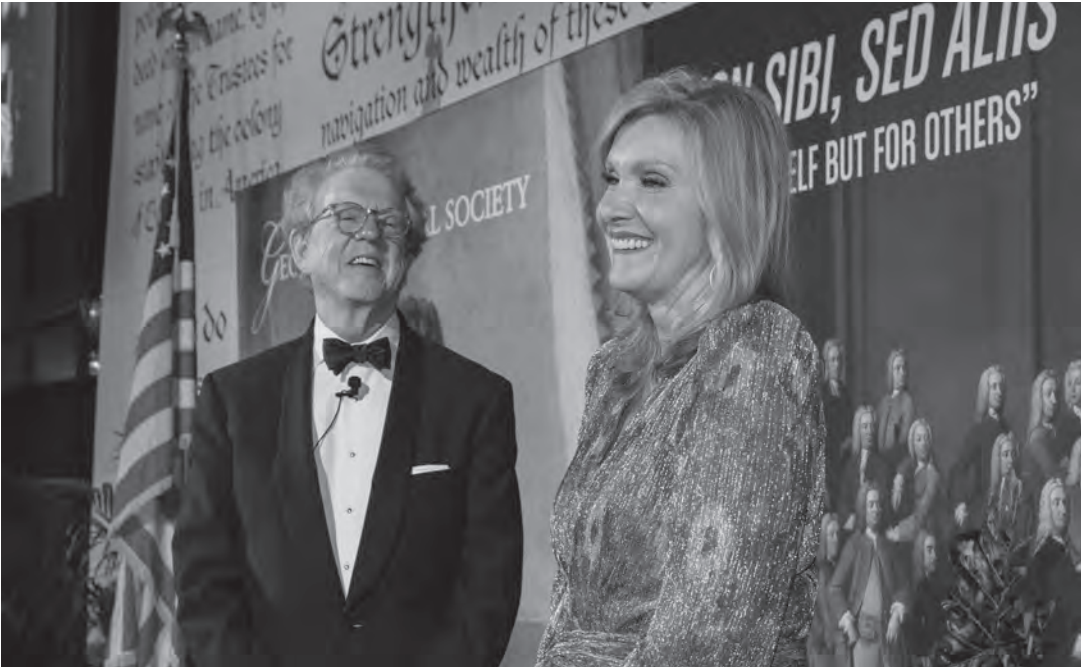

Also, GHS continued its efforts to help the people of the state better understand how the story of race has shaped who we are and where we've been. Several *History and Race Initiative* sessions for business and community leaders were held across the state and included presentations for Leadership Georgia at their meeting in Savannah last May, and at the corporate headquarters of Chick-fil-A, Southern Company, and Georgia Power.

None of this vital work would have been possible without the leadership of the Board of Curators under the chairmanship of Shan Cooper of Atlanta. Our Endowment Trust, chaired by Ted Moore, continued to provide expert oversight of our growing endowment, which in current investments, outstanding pledges, and verified bequests had reached nearly \$22.5 million by the end of the fourth quarter. And as noted above, the *Georgia History Festival* committee, chaired by Dan Cathy and Shirley Franklin, broke all previous records as it helped raise more than \$1.9 million for education and research.

To them and the thousands of Georgia Historical Society members, supporters, and friends everywhere, thank you for traveling with us on this journey by making history education and research a priority in your lives and philanthropy. Together we are doing our part to create a more perfect Union and ensure the survival of the American republic for generations to come.

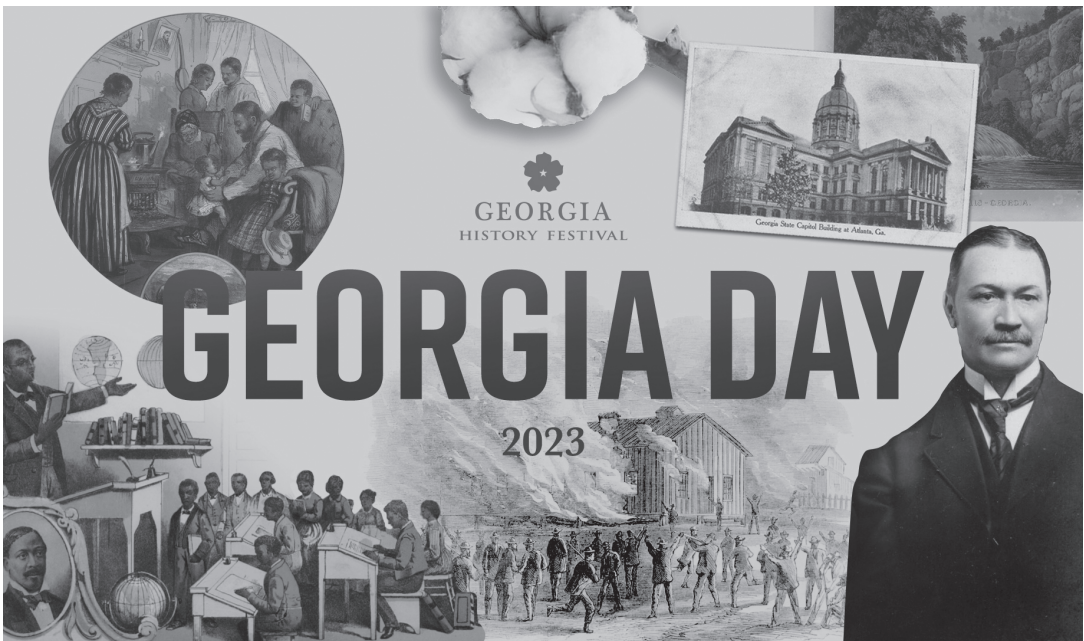

We must grasp the truth that the refugee problem is not just a temporary crisis -- it is a human tragedy that will be with us at least for the remainder of this century. Moreover, we must somehow communicate to our fellow Christians that this tragedy is global in scope..."

Dr. J. Harry Haines, Chairman of Church World Service, was the keynote speaker at a conference on refugees in Atlanta. Throughout the two-day conference in February we heard his comments confirmed and expanded by many other speakers, including refugees from every continent.

We heard Dr. Haines and others speak of the "collapse of communication" and "compassion fatigue" within our churches. Situations change so rapidly that it is virtually impossible to keep would-be sponsors aware of how they can best help, and all too often those who do make the effort "grow weary in well-doing." We heard speakers and saw films documenting the suffering in refugee camps all over the world, camps that are taking in new refugees much faster than they can be passed on to new homes in other countries. It was almost numbing at times to hear of the scope of the problems, or to sense the agony of so many individuals crowded together in seemingly hopeless conditions.

And yet there was always a sense of hope expressed by the speakers, hope based on the stories of compassionate responses of people in many countries -- and a more fundamental hope based on the firm belief that we worship a loving God and that therefore nothing is truly hopeless.

... We have been right in the middle of a powerful demonstration of God's love expressed in gifts of time and money by many hundreds of compassionate people.

Ruby Threatens N.C. Schools

The negress, Ruby Martin (head of the enforcement section of the Dept. of Health, Education & Welfare) sent six of her agents to Harriet County, N. C. They informed the local election Board of Education that their Freedom of Choice plan was "not working." They demanded that students be assigned to different schools to bring about an equal mixing. John Wepo told the Harriet County Board of Education that: "You will receive a letter from Mrs. Ruby Martin of F.E.W. giving you a deadline for working out a plan of your own to increase integration by Sept. 1 of this year."

These are his EXACT words and we clearly see the BLACK hand of reconstruction once again reaching down to destroy our children. There are only two schools in Harriet County. Most negroes voluntarily go to their own school. A few go to the White school. Now Ruby Martin's investigators want half the Whites ordered to go to the Black school and half the negroes bussed over to the White school.

It is time the American people sat up and took notice. This plan will soon be extended to every school district in America. These tyrants in Washington must be stopped. We must stand like the rock of Gibraltar and tell the race-mixing desperados from Washington that they will have to pass over our dead bodies before they destroy our schools. That is the only kind of talk that will shake up our enemy in Washington and make them take notice.

Mobile Resists

Ruby Martin's plan to integrate the public schools in Mobile, Alabama has set off the biggest storm of protest that city has seen to date. People are meeting and organizing to stop the forced mixing of Mobile's schools. There is more open defiance in that town than any other thus far threatened. 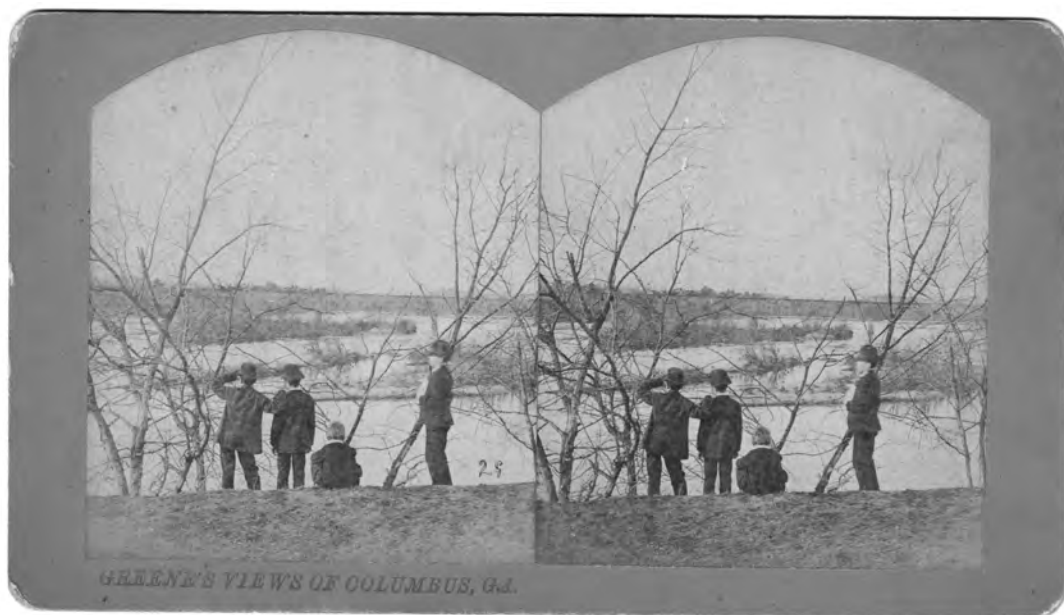

Big Battle In Norfolk, Va.

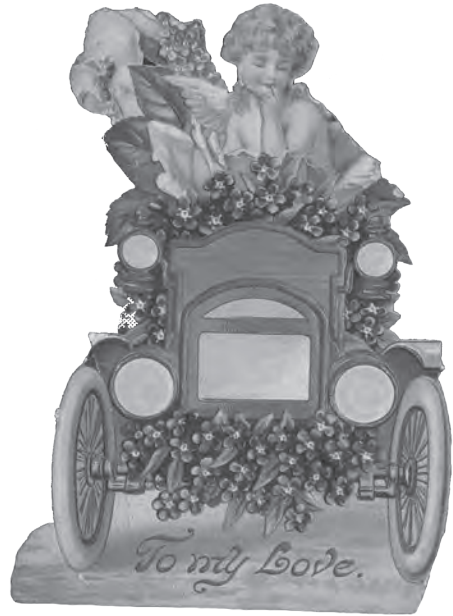
The U. S. Fourth Circuit Court (Judges appointed by the President - not elected) have ordered the redrawing of all that cities school boundaries to force more race-mixing upon the people. They said, "we want faculty desegregation and geographical pupil assignments." Which means they want negroes bussed out of the Black ghetto into the White school areas. The Court said, "neighborhood schools cannot be approved if residence in a neighborhood is denied to colored people on the grounds of color. School bound-

aries must be changed if a racial pattern exists." Jack Greenberg, head of the NAACP Legal Fund called the decision as "outrageous." "The Norfolk opinion shows that site selection for new schools is a matter for judicial supervision." He also said that the Supreme Court ruling, outlawing Freedom of Choice, would now give his NAACP lawyers the opportunity to reopen all cases of court ordered integration to push for pupil placement on racial percentage basis.

PROGRAMS

Georgia History Festival

Georgia History Festival 2022-2023 “The Promise of a More Perfect Union: Reconstruction and the Gilded Age.”

New Educational Resources: GHS published the 2023 edition of *Newspapers in Education*, “Made in Georgia,” exploring the eras of Reconstruction and the Gilded Age and examining the important economic and political changes during that time.

Teacher Webinars: Responding to the need for online instruction, two webinars focusing on resources created to support the *Georgia History Festival* focus of study took place during the winter 2023.

Colonial Faire and Muster—February 4-5, 2023—Audiences of all ages enjoyed this popular, family friendly annual living-history program at Wormsloe State Historic Site, Savannah.

Super Museum Sunday—February 5, 2023—One hundred and twelve cultural institutions across the state participated in the traditional in-person event or virtually with online offerings.

Georgia Day Parade: Despite the weather-related cancellation of the parade in 2023, Georgia students had the opportunity to participate in Georgia Day 2023 through the statewide Student Art Contest and Parade Banner Competition. Both contests explored the theme, “Made in Georgia,” and winners were presented with prizes.

Georgia Day Video: Featuring greetings from *Festival* sponsors as well as historical content highlighting key moments and individuals during the turbulent years of the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries in Georgia, a new video for students studying Georgia history was released for Georgia Day 2023.

Georgia History Festival 2023-2024 “Governing Georgia Across Three Centuries.”

This focus of study is aligned with the Georgia Standards of Excellence and supports students’ understanding of the history and legacy of Georgia’s government and examines the impact of those who governed, and the people’s power to shape, expand, and strengthen democracy over time.

New Educational Resources:

Dispatches From Off the Deaton Path Classroom Resources: GHS hosted a series of four online videos featuring topics related to the *Festival’s* focus of study in the video blog, *Dispatches from Off the Deaton Path*. Two of these videos premiered in the fall of 2023, with the other two to follow in early 2024. Each video is accompanied by a classroom-ready, standards-based educational activity featuring primary sources from the GHS archival collections.

Historical Inquiries: The Three Branches of Government: These classroom-

ready online resources encouraged students to learn about our three branches of government by exploring key moments in Georgia and American history and asking questions about the development and evolution of our governmental system. These inquiry-based resources are aligned to the Georgia Standards of Excellence and encouraged students to examine primary documents and secondary sources to gain a better understanding of the ongoing story of our American democracy.

A Legacy of Leadership: Georgia's Elected Officials: To support the 2024 Georgia Day Classroom and Art Competitions, GHS presented classroom-ready resources that encouraged students to explore “A Legacy of Leadership.” Comprised of a unique digital resource, a primary source set, and a teacher guide, this new classroom resource bundle helped students understand how Georgia’s elected officials demonstrated leadership qualities and executed their responsibility to govern. All resource elements are aligned to the Georgia Standards of Excellence.

Teacher Webinars:

- **Research Roundup: Using Online Research Tools from GHS**
Presenting unique collections of archival materials and other GHS research tools, this webinar for teachers, students, and parents introduced the work of historical archives focusing on the GHS online catalog to support historical research.
- ***A Legacy of Leadership: Georgia's Election Officials: Georgia Day Webinar***
Highlighting the *A Legacy of Leadership: Georgia's Elected Officials* digital publication, this live webinar for K-12 teachers supported and encouraged student participation in the annual Georgia Day events.
- **Using *Dispatches from Off the Deaton Path* in the Classroom**
This live webinar for K-12 teachers highlighted education resources created to enhance special *Festival* editions of *Dispatches from Off the Deaton Path*.

In-School Programs:

Partnering with Savannah’s Massie Heritage Center through the traveling program, History on Wheels, GHS staff led students through an interactive activity focused on the Siege of Savannah. Using the primary sources of historic maps and eye-witness accounts, students investigated one of the costliest battles of the American Revolution.

Programs for General Audiences:

- **Georgia History Festival Kickoff Event: September 14, 2023:** “A Conversation with Sidney M. Milkis.” In partnership with UVA Club of Savannah, GHS’s Dr. Stan Deaton and Dr. Sidney M. Milkis, White Burkett Miller Professor in the Department of Politics and a Faculty Fellow at the Miller Center at the University of Virginia, discussed the history of the American presidency, American political parties, and American political development.

General Educational Programs and Resources

Educational Outreach: Online and in-person resources for teachers and students contain relevant historical content, educational videos, primary sources, tips for classroom instruction, fully developed lesson plans, and resource guides aligned to state performance standards.

Teaching with Primary Sources: In 2023, GHS education staff and historical marker staff worked to extend training opportunities for teachers in the form of a self-paced online course built on the *Teaching the Civil Rights Movement with the Georgia Historical Marker Program* training course. The new course, *Teaching with the Georgia Historical Marker Program*, was scheduled to launch in early 2024.

Teacher Training and Webinars: GHS staff delivered multiple in-person training opportunities for teachers based on the *Teaching the Georgia Historical Marker Program* teacher training project throughout the year. GHS historical marker staff participated in two Bibb County School District professional development days and a Georgia Studies professional development day with Savannah-Chatham County School District. Programs staff also participated in a series of training sessions for Fulton County educators in the spring of 2023. All trainings focused on incorporating primary sources and the Georgia Historical Marker Program and reached over one hundred educators at the middle school and high school levels.

GHS Program staff also participated in two in-person sessions at the annual Georgia Council for the Social Studies conference held in Athens on October 25 and 26, 2023, promoting both the *Teaching with the Georgia Historical Marker Program* course and materials created for the *Georgia History Festival*.

GHS Education Newsletters: Education staff published fourteen GHS Education newsletters featuring monthly updates and special announcements.

Public Programs

Recognizing an Imperfect Past: A History and Race Initiative: Through this initiative, the Georgia Historical Society seeks to educate and use the power of our shared history to foster difficult but necessary conversations that offer all Americans new and deeper perspectives on the past and the present. During 2023, GHS implemented a variety of program activities, including history presentations for corporate teams and executive groups, and a one-day training seminar for Georgia teachers.

- **Team Presentations:** On May 5, 2023, Dr. Stan Deaton and Dr. Anastacia Scott delivered a presentation to Gulfstream employees during an in-person lecture and discussion.
- **Executive Sessions:** On March 29, May 1, and November 2, 2023, GHS staff led executive discussion sessions with community and business leaders in the Atlanta area.
- **Teacher Training Seminar:** On June 27, 2023, GHS hosted a professional development seminar for K-12 educators. At the all-day event entitled, “Teaching Challenging Histories in Georgia,” which took place at the GHS Research Center in Savannah, educators from across Georgia were introduced to classroom strategies and resources to support teaching complex historical topics such as slavery, Jim Crow, racial violence, and the Civil Rights Movement.

Business History Initiative: GHS welcomed Anthem Blue Cross Blue Shield, Byrd Cookie Company, Fieldale Farms, and the Georgia Lottery Corporation as new honorees of the Georgia Business History Initiative in 2023. Work began on public and classroom educational resources for all honorees and will be completed in 2024.

Vincent J. Dooley Distinguished Fellows Program: In 2023, GHS opened the application for the second class of Dooley Research Fellows. Selections were made in early 2024, and fellows will begin their residency in May 2024.
