

GEORGIA UNCOVERED: INVESTIGATING OUR STATE'S LEGENDS

Hernando De Soto

History is made up of stories, some based in fact, some come from legend, and others are combination of the two.

A fact is a "thing that is known or proved to be true." There is evidence that supports the story.

A **legend** is a traditional story told about a particular place or person, and can include elements of folklore, mythology or explanations for natural occurrences.

In the case of Hernando De Soto, it's difficult to decipher fact from legend. Much of what is known comes fromt the writings of De Soto's men and has been romaticized. Little to no written evidence was left by the indigenous people.
